Adventures in Caring Shifts to Student Leadership

For the first time in its history, Adventures in Caring has shifted responsibility from program coordinators to oncampus student leadership. Student leaders include: Andrea Ure, head of Continual Improvement, Krishna Balagopal, head of Outreach, Jesse Basra, head of Program Documentation, and Isabel Arana, head of Service and Fundraising. New interns are encouraged to join one or more of these committees.

These student heads have eagerly jumped into their roles, focusing on planning three to four on- campus volunteer meetings per quarter. "It is extremely important for all the interns to share their experiences," Shane Pathania, President of AIC's campus organization explained. "We should feel like we have a support system here on campus, to share stories and losses. We are focused on cultivating a community of like-minded, caring individuals." "We have the opportunity to rediscover the impact that the Raggedys have on their communities, and also evaluate the ways that we ourselves can become better listeners," added Jesse Basra, the head of the Program Documentation Committee.

The volunteer recruitment process itself has being undergoing substantial changes, with April 2019 being the first cycle completely run by students. Krishna Balagopal, head of the Outreach Committee, along with Anmole Adhi, Volunteer Coordinator, spearheaded the recruitment cycle. New recruitment methods were brainstormed and implemented, targeting mostly pre-medical students and freshman. The April 2019 cycle was fruitful, with fourteen new interns and a waiting list for this upcoming fall.
